

COPETON DIAMONDS.

SOME RICH DEVELOPMENTS.

65 CARATS TO HALF A LOAD.

INVERELL, Monday.

Some rich diamond developments are reported to-day at the deep shaft mine, Copeton.

On Friday and Saturday last a wash of a sensational nature was made. From less than half a load 65 carats of diamonds were obtained, and 42 diamonds were picked out of the face.

These diamonds are of good quality. In general characteristics they are round and plump, averaging nearly half a carat throughout.

On Friday a black diamond, weighing $2\frac{1}{2}$ carats was discovered, and these black diamonds found at this mine have weighed as high as $4\frac{1}{2}$ carats. This rich diamond deposit, which is 2 feet thick, is estimated from prospects washed from the face to yield 150 carats to a load.

A new shaft has just been sunk for a distance of 156 feet in order to connect this rich face with the main winding shaft. For the whole of the distance between these two shafts (some 500 feet), a continuous run of diamond dirt has been met with, the mine being one of the most consistent diamond producers on the field.

Operations have been in full swing in this mine for the past five years, and annually many thousands of carats of diamonds have been won. With these recent developments at the deep shaft, the permanency of Copeton as a diamond-producing centre is assured.

The deep shaft mine is owned by a syndicate, comprising the Marshall Brothers, Sheridan Brothers, and F. Cerrilaw.

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
